Report/Minutes

Prof. Gina Rippon delivered session – 'Brains – pink and blue or fifty shades of grey?' (paraphrased words of Dr Rippon)

- Discussed negative response from mainstream media regarding efforts to debunk the myth of a male and female brain
- Mentioned the *No More Boys and Girls: Can Our Kids Go Gender Free?* Experiment.
- Children feel parents wouldn't want them to play with certain toys due to gender discrepancy despite parents reporting to be more supportive.
- Children shown to respond to social stimulus as early as 3 months old *Just Babies: The origins of good and evil -* Paul Bloom
- Humans are great at following/seeking rules
- Experiments demonstrate how experience of negative stereotypes can impact brain activity
- Neuro plasticity through environmental means undermines biological pre-determinates (expressed through crude generalising: stereotyping)
- There is very little difference in terms of female vs male brains (weight being one of them); it is in fact environment (in this case focussing on social influence of gendering) that creates the sizeable divide we see between sexes, not biology.
